## PEEK INTO THE PLAINS' PAST

Did you know a Rebel soldier and a Yankee spy share a grave in The Plains? In the early 1930s, Virginia state highway contractors began connecting Main Street to the current Route 55. While excavating and grading the road on the outskirts of town, the contractors uncovered two bodies. One was a soldier buried in a Confederate uniform and the other a man in his underwear. A cursory examination of the second skeleton showed a broken neck, suggesting he may have been hanged. Speculation was that the man with the broken neck had been a Union spy who had killed the Confederate to get his uniform. When the spy was caught, they stripped him of the uniform and hung him for treason. The dead Confederate soldier was dressed in his uniform and the two were buried together. After the contractors discovered the bodies, they were reburied off the right-of-way with permission of the landowner. John Gott, a Fauquier County historian, arranged to have a plaque installed at the gravesite in the 1960s. A bureaucrat in Richmond included wording that the two men died in a field hospital nearby, but no such hospital existed in records.

After completing research, John Gott had a display erected at the intersection of Main Street and Fauquier Avenue that explains what happened. "On August 28th, 1862, a Federal spy named Jack Sterry was caught by Confederate Gen. John Hood and judged a "Jessie Scout,"

named for Jessie Fremont, wife of Union Gen. John Freemont, who suggested that Federal spies avoid detection by dressing in Confederate uniforms. Sterry was discovered when the soldier from whom he stole the uniform was found nearby, mortally wounded. The dying soldier identified his assailant, and the swift sentence was determined by a drum-head court."

# SPREADING OUR WINGS at SUMMER CAMP

Maybe you saw our Campers in town this summer. They were out on walking field trips, playing sports on the lawn and in the Town Park, and climbing on or off the buses on their way to and from Middleburg for swimming. It's a special treat to see the town's kids enjoying themselves with summer activities, made possible by the generous support of our neighbors, local businesses and foundations. Thank you all for your support!

This is the second year of our Camp program and we are so pleased with the impact TPCL is able to make within the community of The Plains. Without this free summer camp, most of these children would have had nowhere to go and nothing to do but watch television or sleep. But Summer Camp means the children have a safe, air-conditioned Community House with space to relax, read, play games, do arts and crafts, and other activities, all of them planned and supervised. And the Campers are assured a daily lunch and snack to fuel all this, something many families can't take for granted when school is out.

In total, 73 people directly participated in Camp: staff, campers, volunteers who provided walking field trips, snacks, lunches, errands, books, classes, equipment, crafts, and many other needed donations. The activities were varied and intended to help these children spread their wings – it was a pleasure to watch them grow!

We think it was a perfect summer for everyone, but don't take our word for it! Here is what some of our Counselors and Counselors-in-Training (CITS) say about it:

The Counselors say, "Our program is to help families in need. Some of their children would have to stay home by themselves and this gives them a place to come and to feel safe... their parents trust us enough to do that... We're able to do fun activities with them, offer them free lunch, we're able to take them to the pool."

And the CITS say, "Yeah, I'm a counselor-in-training so I have to watch how they (the Counselors) work first and next year, too, unless they think I was good

enough I can be an actual counselor. (We) call it counselor-in-training instead of saying volunteer counselor (because) we are watching and also helping."

An innovation this year is the Camp Store where Campers can exchange tokens for toys and other items. CITS say, "The store where they earn money (tokens) during the week. Yeah, I think that's a plus because then they like actually doing chores... they wanna do more stuff so they can earn their money. My brother, he's never worked this much. It's teaching them how to save because in the real world you can't just (buy things). It depends how much they do, how much they don't. People don't do anything at all and they don't get anything -you understand the normal balance."

# HELPING STUDENTS SPREAD THEIR WINGS

At 3:15 high schoolers begin spilling into the Community House. The students greet Director Erica Young with hugs and quick updates on how their day went. They sit at their table, pull out their schoolwork, and compare notes as they wait for retired Fauquier County math teacher, Laura Nix-Berg, to arrive and provide support.

A little later, elementary and middle school students arrive on the bus from Marshall and Coleman. Thompson students are driven by their parents as we are not on their bus route. They all grab snacks and drinks from the kitchen and head to their tutoring rooms to chat and relax before pulling out their homework. As the high schoolers finish their work, they morph from student to tutor to help the younger students.

The tutoring program has over 30 students ranging from kindergarten to high school seniors attending on Tuesdays and Thursdays throughout the school year. The youngest students work on early literacy skills, the elementary and middle school students receive help completing

homework and reinforcing academic concepts taught in school.

In addition to the high schoolers, our tutors are retired teachers, business owners, homemakers, and young adults. Some have tutored for over a decade while others have just begun. They tutor because they want to support our community and because they enjoy working with children and teens.

We have instructional materials to get you started and fellow tutors to help. We'll even provide the necessary background check. 


# THE PLAINS COMMUNITY LEAGUE FINANCIALS
